In November, more than 160 of Montefiore's 500-strong volunteer base gathered at the Randwick campus for the annual Spirit of Volunteering event, which included an awards presentation and inspiring keynote addresses by The Hon. Tanya Plibersek MP, Member for Sydney and Deputy Leader of the Opposition, and her daughter Anna Coutts-Trotter, who is a dedicated student volunteer at Montefiore Randwick.

Ms Plibersek's address covered issues including the gender pay gap and action on violence against women, and also drew a connection between the Australian tradition of volunteerism - which contributes more than \$14 billion to our economy each year – and the true meaning of being a 'good citizen'.

"Volunteering is very much part of the Australian character and what glues us together as a society," said Ms Plibersek. "And it draws on the same qualities it takes to be a good citizen – engagement, connection and responsibility." Referring to the current citizenship turmoil engulfing Federal Parliament, she continued: "It's not about the paperwork or where your grandparents came from, citizenship is about the contribution we make. Volunteers are always the first to tell you that it's not about what you get, but what you give."

Ms Plibersek's daughter Anna, 16, impressed the audience with the same maturity and compassion she shows in volunteering with the residents of Monte Terrace dementia care unit, where she and a schoolmate have volunteered for nearly two years. "There are few things as rewarding as my time at Montefiore" Anna said. "We run a trivia game every week with the residents – they don't remember us, but they love seeing us and thank us each time, asking us questions about our lives."

As part of the event, Ms Plibersek, Montefiore President David Freeman AM, CEO Robert Orie, Volunteer Manager Hazel Stein and Volunteer Coordinator Jane Silverman presented 48 volunteers with special service awards – Mazel Tov to all the recipients!

The Year in Review

It's almost impossible to count the ways in which our tireless team of more than 500 volunteers makes a difference across the organisation, so below are just a few of the areas where they contributed, as covered in the recently published Montefiore Annual Report for 2016-17.

Each year, the Volunteer Department organises two key events to celebrate and honour all those who contribute their time. The Spirit of Volunteering Recognition Event in November 2016 featured keynote speaker William Nemesh, Jewish Community Relationship Manager at the NSW Jewish Board of Deputies, while guests at the National Volunteer Week function in May 2017 heard from Ramona Freedman on her experiences as a young mother undergoing cancer treatment.

At Randwick and Woollahra, the past year has seen the introduction of Welcome Ambassadors who present new residents with a welcome gift and introduce them to life at Montefiore. New regular activities at Randwick include the introduction of an Afrikaans conversation group, Men's (Gibborim) Group, and pet therapy sessions in the nursing home with our canine volunteers.

At Woollahra, we have begun a knitting group as well as regular visits to the Randwick boutique. At Hunters Hill, we have seen the Library Trolley service extended to Monte Gardens and the Shabbat Trolley service now staffed by volunteers, as well as new weekly evening activities and shopping services introduced to great success. The Welcome program for new residents has also been extended to nursing home areas.

Our Ladies' Committee is an integral part of our volunteer base. Thanks must go once again to Co-Presidents Wendy Engelander and Annette Joseph for their fundraising efforts in support of the vital Holocaust Staff Awareness Program undertaken by all staff. As well as running the boutique with assistance from other volunteers, events have included a Bridge Evening in April 2017 that raised a record-breaking \$12,000.

Another very special group of volunteers are those who spend time with our residents to record their Life Stories, producing more than 200 such memoirs over the past 12 years.

Thanks to the Intergenerational and Community Service programs, more than 50 student volunteers join with residents for leisure activities as well as offering support with practical tasks such as computing. Schools involved include Moriah College, Emanuel School, Masada College, Kesser Torah, SCEGGS, Sydney Girls High School, Reddam, Randwick Girls High School, Balmain High School, St Ignatius College Riverview, St Aloysius' College, Loreto Kirribilli and Meriden. In addition, preschool students from Moriah and Emanuel visit to take part in special Kabbalat Shabbat services. This year we also hosted 23 students from Bnos Kanfei New York, who visited as part of their overseas summer camp.

Thanks once again to our wonderful and valued Volunteer Manicurists at Hunters Hill, who recently made their annual donation to Montefiore. This year, their contribution was two lpads for our Leisure and Lifestyle team, who will use them to help residents connect with family and friends via Skype and email. 
